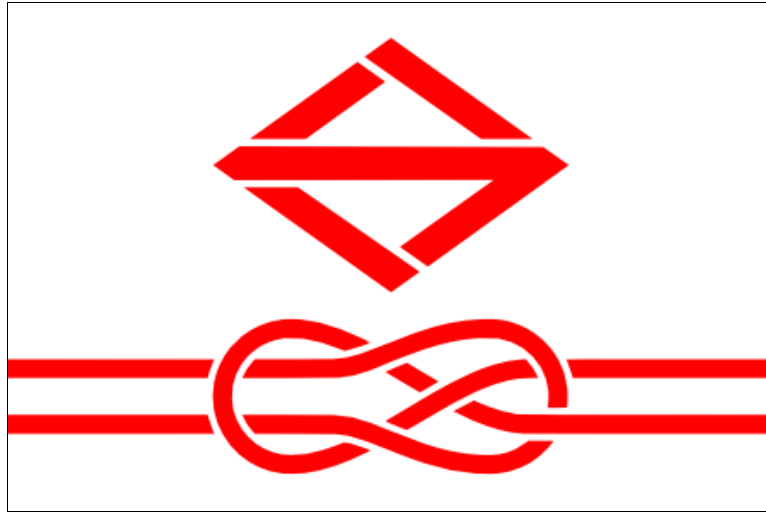

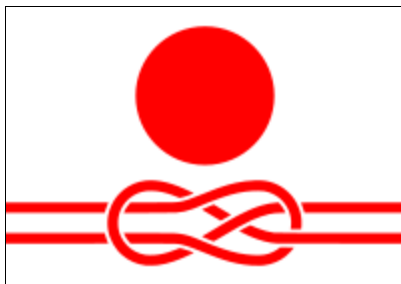

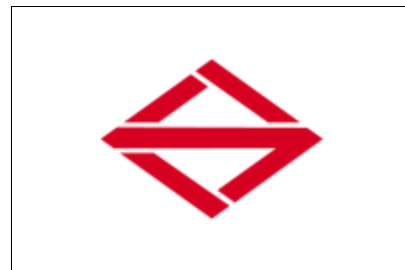
The Congress Flag
